# Dear Parents/Caregivers Kia Ora Tatou

This week has been quite busy with a number of students travelling for the winter tournament sports competitions representing South Otago High School in netball, rugby and soccer, both boys and girls. During the week results have been trickling in and the feedback was very positive. It has been so good that students have been able to have this opportunity to travel and play when earlier this year and even this term it all seemed so unlikely.

Back in school it has been reassuring to see students focussing on their studies as the end of the year draws even closer. For senior students there will be slightly less than seven school weeks to complete internal assessments and prepare for external exams and portfolio submissions. The remaining time is precious and we expect to see students persevering with their studies to achieve their true potential.

#### **Senior options**

Students in Year 10 to 12 have received the course option details for 2021 and are currently meeting with senior leaders to confirm that their selection is going to meet the needs for their future goals. As in previous years, for Y12 and 13 students we have an increasing number of options for students who would like to follow vocational programmes leading to trade qualifications.

Some Year 12 students are considering transitioning to tertiary providers under the lure of fees free promotions for certain trades. Whilst I appreciate the appeal of moving to a city and studying full time there are other costs for students which are not free such as transport, accommodation, rent, food and utilities. Tertiary students are finding part time work more challenging to secure.

Whilst I do not wish to stop students from making the transition at the end of Year 12 to tertiary study I do encourage students to thoroughly research what is entailed and the full costs. Sorry Mum and Dad you may have your son/daughter at home for another year! But, from feedback we have received in the past from parents, employers and other providers, Year 13 is a year when a

lot of our young people really grow up and mature which supports their future transition to employment or tertiary study.

#### **Community Consultation**

Our community consultation process continues next week with a visit to Clydevale, Monday 7 September at 7pm and then Kaitangata, Thursday 10 September at 7pm.

I am looking forward to meeting parents at both of these meetings and receiving feedback to support our ongoing development. The information provided will provide guidance to the Board as we set the strategic direction for the school for the next three years.

As we are working under Covid-19 Alert Level 2 at the present time I would ask that you please register for one of the meetings detailed below. We will ask participants to use the hand santitiser provided on arrival and we will have a contact register for each of the events. 

#### **Boys football tournament**

The South Otago High School boy's first XI football team went to tournament in Invercargill this week playing a range of teams. Southland Boys High school was their first group game on Monday morning. The boys threw everything but the kitchen sink at the opposition goal including Caleb McKay and James Hayward who hit the woodwork three times. Jack Murray slotted home a well earnt penalty created by Oliver Wakelin who found himself in a one on one with the goal keeper before being brought down from behind. Moments later we had a penalty awarded against us and the result was a hard to swallow 1-1 draw.

Game 2 on Tuesday morning against play Mount Aspiring. The boys were worried about this fixture before the tournament and after having seen Southland Boys High School concede four against them on Monday afternoon we felt a little more confident especially given the number of opportunities we could have converted into goals against Southland Boys. Unfortunately it wasn't our day and though we fought hard and pushed Mount Aspiring on a number of occasions we were again unable to convert chances into goals. #### Pop Up Covid Testing in Balclutha

Clutha District residents are encouraged to get tested for COVID-19.

Clutha Health First, Tokomairiro Waiora, Clutha District Council, WellSouth primary health network and Southern DHB are providing COVID-19 swabbing at a one day 'pop-up' surveillance testing site.

#### The drive-through testing centre will be at:

Cross Recreation Centre - 18 Glasgow Street, Balclutha Thursday 10 September, 10am to 4pm

"I encourage everyone to come out and have a test, even if you don't have any symptoms," says Ray Anton, CEO, Clutha Health First. "It only takes a few minutes and it's free."

This pop-up surveillance site is part of ongoing surveillance testing in the South and around the country that is happening over the next couple of weeks.

Dr Susan Jack, Southern DHB, Medical Officer of Health, says testing asymptomatic people in the community is an important part of ensuring the district continues to be free of COVID-19.

"We remain at Alert Level 2 and there are currently no cases of COVID-19 or community transmission in the district," she says. "Pop up testing sites help us to continue to ensure this is the case – particularly as people are moving around the country more."

Wendy Findlay, WellSouth Director of Nursing, says: "This drive through pop-up testing site helps make COVID-19 testing convenient and accessible."

Clutha District Mayor Bryan Cadogan says: "I encourage everyone in the Clutha District to show solidarity and support. This is a prudent measure that we should all contribute to and do our part."

#### Testing available in general practice

Testing continues to be available for people with symptoms at general practices throughout the Southern region. Anyone wanting testing should call their GP or 0800 VIRUS19 (0800 847-8719) to be referred for testing. Testing is free and available seven days a week.

#### What to know about COVID-19 testing:

COVID testing is free for everyone, regardless of citizenship or visa status.

Information is not shared for immigration related or other enforcement purposes.

You don't need to be enrolled with a doctor or general practice to be tested.

You don't need to self-isolate (But if you are sick, stay home until you are symptom-free - just as you should when you have a cold.)

You do need to provide contact details – usually a phone number – so you can be informed of your test results. More Health Information
