Dear Parents/Caregivers *Kia Ora Tatou*

It was great news to hear we are moving to Alert Level 1 so quickly after the uncertainty at the start of the week. While new cases in the community are always disappointing to hear of, it is reassuring to see how quickly they have been identified. I am sure we are all grateful for the efforts of our health workers, scientists and technicians in this regard, and the thousands of people who have been tested. I would expect that those who have suffered from this outbreak and are infected are being treated with kindness.

As a community we need to avoid the complacency which New Zealanders tend to quickly move into when we are at lower alert levels. Please do continue to scan QR codes and monitor closely for illness within your whānau.

Our focus as always will be to support the learning, safety and wellbeing of our students as well as the school community and we continue to be here to support you too.

National Touch Tournament

Over last weekend we did have a number of students who were representing Otago in the National Touch Tournament in Auckland. I spoke to parents of these students at the start of the week regarding the students safety and well being. They were supportive and appreciated the reasons why we requested that these students should stay at home for a few days upon return from Auckland. Thank you to the parents who supported our precautions to keep our community safe.

Year 9 student and parent survey

This week all new Year 9 students have been sent an e-mail with a link to a short survey for both students and parents to complete. It would be appreciated if parents could sit with their son/ daughter to complete this survey before Thurs 25 February. All respondents go in the draw for a Warehouse voucher which will be drawn after the survey closes.

Vaping

It is both disappointing and concerning to report that once again we have had a small number of students who have vape devices in school and have been using/sharing these. The school treats vaping the same as smoking. All schools are Smokefree environments and covered by the Smokefree legislation. So vaping on school grounds is not permitted and is in fact illegal.

The sale and use of vape devices and products are restricted items and it is illegal for young people under the age of 18 to possess or use these products.

As a school we have no way of knowing what is in the vape fluid. When we have spoken to students they have tended to rely upon what their friend has told them is in the vape pen. This is unsafe.

Considering the start of this newsletter is about how we should all take care of our health and the issue of Covid-19, I can think of no better way to spread germs, viruses or any infection than by transferring a vape device from one person's mouth to the next!

As a school, we will confiscate vape devices and ask parents to collect them from the school office. If parents do not make arrangements to collect these devices and products that have been confiscated they will be disposed of at the end of each month.

On Thursday we had a group of students travel early in the morning to Wanaka for the Wanaka Challenge youth triathlon. The students had a long day and I am sure will have really enjoyed the experience. Students demonstrated great perseverance in taking on this challenging event. We were very fortunate that the alert level was dropped to Level 1 to enable this event to go ahead. A full report on the students' participation features in this newsletter. I look forward to seeing all our students participating and enjoying the athletics day events next Wednesday. Assuming that we remain at Alert Level 1 I would like to extend an invitation to whanau to come along and support students in this great competition.



Rotary Science Conference Workshop




Wanaka Challenge
