**Wellbeing- Student Support** 

Year 9 students and Year 13 leaders met in mentoring time on Wednesday to talk through our values and learn more about positive behaviour for learning (PB4L). I praised the year 9s for their respectful behaviour. For example they have been lining up patiently at the canteen and the importance of looking out for one another and asking for help from teachers if needed. Students were encouraged to use a range of supports at school and at home. The school does have security cameras in place, in general students have been doing a great job of looking after and naming their belongings. Sam Stratford and Kareena Dunlop, our head students both spoke about our three values of respect, excellence and perseverance, they used examples from their time at school and quotes to support their messages of support for students encouraging them with positive behaviour around the school and supporting one another. Mrs Ward the Year 9 Dean talked with the group about the values REP cards reminding them to get them signed and in the box, the first of the badges will be awarded next week. To start with students need 12 signatures of any one value to receive a badge. Students were shown the token box that sits at the office. When they hand their cards in they receive a token, there will be three choices which students have input into. For example, two shade sails were erected outside the canteen in the school colours, these look great and the positive behaviour of the students led to the purchase of these. Mr Palmer also spoke with students about respectful behaviour, he did a role play with a student showing them how to walk across the stage to receive for example a certificate or badge- shirt tucked in, eye contact and a firm handshake were encouraged.
