
















## OUASSA 2022



Leah McLaren Year 13

This year I had the privilege of attending two-week long science camps during both the January and July holidays, this is the Otago University Advanced Student Science Academy, also known as OUASSA. These camps are for those in year 13 who attend a rural, low decile or small high school.

On the first couple days of both camps, I got to do chemistry while working in the Mellor Labs with two different chemistry professors. In January the workshops included a coloured solution competition where we made multiple solutions out of mystery chemicals and concentrations. During the workshop in July we made a bright blue catalyst. Halfway through the first week I got to do psychology where I learnt about the brain and took a deeper look into my own brain functions. My second elective was pharmacology: here I learnt about the effect of drugs on the body. A test with caffeine was done with multiple instructions that were compared to when I was in my normal state.

For the last two days of both camps I got to work in the physical education department on sports and exercise science, this included being able to use the flume, that is the only one in the Southern Hemisphere, to construct tests on drag. I also had the privilege to do 3rd year level tests on motion and biomechanics.

A highlight from the camp was getting the chance to write, record and edit a science podcast for OAR FM which then got broadcasted on the radio.

These weeks also included fun activities run by the green shirt mentors, talks presented by top scientists at the university, eating dried insects and a trip out to Allen's beach to see the sea lions.

Not only did the OUASSA camps give me a huge insight on science at university, it gave me a chance to meet some awesome people that share the same interest and love for science as me.

On Sunday 27th February, two vans full of Year 12 Geography students along with Mr Beeby and Mrs Bensley, headed up country to Twizel to carry out some geographic research and explore the South Island High Country.

After a very scenic drive and lunch stop in Omarama where some of the boys did their best to support the local retail industry, it was off to Twizel and the Fraser Stream, the setting for our research. The students carry out a 5-credit research internal assessment examining the fluvial processes of a stream. They're required to collect data at at least two sites which involves measuring sediment, width and depth of the water and stream velocity. Thankfully there was no snow on the ground like last year's trip, but the water was still pretty chilly. Back at the High Country Lodge - our home away from home - that night there was bookwork to do sharing data and making calculations.

The middle day of our trip offers the students the opportunity to see parts of New Zealand not many Kiwis get to see - the Hooker Glacier and Mt Cook and Lake Pukaki from the air! Due to some low cloud we rearranged our day, heading first up to Hooker Glacier lake. As the cloud cleared we had the best views of the glacier, but also of Mt Cook/Aoraki. Plenty of photos and selfies taken, and some students managed to get some ice from the lake. It was then back to Glentanner for our helicopter flights. This is always a highlight of our trip, and it sure was fantastic!

Travelling home via the Waitaki Valley on Tuesday allowed us to look at the wider Waitaki Hydro Scheme. It is quite amazing to see how humans have altered the landscape. A stop at Benmore Dam highlighted these alterations and how much South Island rivers have changed and provided for NZ's electricity demands. Overall, a successful trip full of fun moments as well as learning opportunities. A special thank you to Mr Beeby and Mrs Bensley for the time and expertise, and for all the wonderful home baking supplied.

To help put our learning into context, Mrs Murdoch and Mr Swallow took our class to the Otago Museum on the 6th of September. An expert on Human Evolution gave us various talks around the museum and also gave us interactive activities which allowed us to view and evaluate our learning from a different perspective. We were fortunate enough to view Hominin skull replicas including; H.Habilis, H.Erectus and H.Neanderthalensis. These different species could then be compared to different tool technologies such as Oldowan, Archeulean, Mousterian and Upper Paleolithic. We also looked at how agriculture and farming has evolved since it began 12,000 years ago. To finish the day off with the classes request we visited the Tuhura Tropical Forest to see the Butterflies. Overall it was an extremely enjoyable day that the entire class benefited from.







# Year 10 "All About Paua" Marine Science Extension Programme

On the first week we were searching for wildlife and documenting them at different distances along the shoreline. At the programmes second week my group decided to do our study of preferences of Pauas food and their eating habits, taking five different types of brown seaweed

weighing them all at 100 grams and leaving them overnight in a tank with a Paua to simply see which ones were the lightest by the end of the next day, and looking for any patterns in texture and phlorotannin. After the initial test checking the control groups show that the ones eaten the most are also the ones growing the fastest and gained the most weight. Overall it was a great experience and a lovely opportunity to meet new people from over Otago.

At the Marine biology programme, my team "Paua Power" decided to investigate whether or not the size and shape of the Paua affected their turnover time, which means how long it takes for the Paua to upright themselves after being inverted. On the Fieldwork day in Karitane we searched for any Paua hiding in rock pools to measure their length and width. We also went on a walk to learn about the importance the ocean and its inhabitants have on the land. In the Lab, we timed each Paua in our control group after turning it upside down in a water tank, and experimented with adding rocks to aid the Paua while they attempted to upright themselves. I thoroughly enjoyed meeting new people and working together as a team, as well as learning and growing together. I have many fond memories and new skills from the programme, and would highly recommend it to anyone who loves learning and making new friendships.

At the marine biology, all about paua study, my team was looking at the amount of seaweed different species of paua eat and what kinds of seaweed they preferred. On the first day we went down to Butterfly Bay to collect data using transects and quadrats. The next day we met at the Marine Biology Centre in Portobello where we got a tour and started setting up our investigation. For our investigation we used multiple tanks and two different species of paua, Yellowfoot and

Blackfoot, and three different types of seaweed. Once we had gotten all our results, we made an animated slide and poster to share with the public and our parents. The highlight of the trip for me was meeting so many new people from all over Otago and learning so much about Paua and seaweed.

## Gifted and Talented Week

This year we ran the celebration of giftedness in the first week of August due to Covid. It was impressive to see such a diverse range of junior students participating in the activities. For Mathematics, Mr Sibley provided brain teaserpuzzles that required lateral and logical thinking. These puzzles challenged the problem-solving of some of our most able junior mathematicians. In particular, the students Ashley Malone, Mikayla Seed and Emmalee Batt shone in these activities.



Mrs Penn and Miss Graham also challenged their selected students' thinking abilities by running a fictitious murder-mystery involving a plot, clues and questioning techniques to help solve the crime. Likewise, Miss Graham also ran a live version of Cluedo. Again, students had to decipher clues in groups. In this case, it turned out the murderer was the headmaster (not to be confused with Mr Wright!).



For Science, Mr Smith set the students the challenge to build a battery-driven model car that could ascend steep ramps. Students learned about torque and gear ratios while they competed against each other to see who could produce the car that could travel up the steepest ramp. Riley May won the competition by a comfortable margin.

Mrs Williams gave her selected Art students the opportunity to create small carved sculptures Inspired by koru forms. The students got to practise new skills and think outside the box.

Mr Bertanees and Mr Williams ran activities on Māori tuakana-teina and tikanga. During these activities, students learned how to lead a haka. And a guest visit by Ruth Baldwin gave them the great opportunity to learn more about our local history, such as the Port Molyneux measles epidemic of the early 1800s.

In Outdoor Education and PE, Mr Palmer and Mr Ensor took a group of students to Kaihiku Falls. Students were required to abseil off the falls into the deep cold pool below. This was a challenge for many of the students and a really cool opportunity to experience one of the activities associated with Outdoor Education. All of the students had a go and demonstrated a high level of resilience and perseverance.





## Gifted and Talented Award

Late last year we were fortunate enough to have three of our students receive ministry awards to pursue special projects. The value of these awards ranges from five hundred and up to twelve hundred. Below are some details from these students on their projects:



#### Ryan William - Riparian Planting and Wetlands Conservation

"The Gifted and Talented award is a scholarship available to gifted and talented high school students in any specific area. Personally last year I received a gifted and talented learners award to continue my research in science and to attend conferences and other events. While the implications of the covid-19 pandemic have had an impact on the timeline of my research, the opportunity provided through this award allows me to have the funds needed to continue my research and further understand different subject areas through practical investigation. Personally, my area of research has been on native swamps, wetlands, and marshlands in the local Clutha district area and how/ if they can improve water quality and agricultural sustainability,

while working in Dunedin laboratories to analyse my data. Water pollution is a huge problem within and outside of the agricultural industry, through research we are able to find ways we can solve these problems and become part of the solution. Overall the Gifted and Talented Award has provided me with an amazing opportunity to carry on with my research and attend conferences and events to further my understanding in fields of research and enjoyment, already allowing me to attend 2 events later this year. I believe the gifted and talented award is a great opportunity and if anyone has a specific area of interest that you perform at to a high level you should definitely apply. If you have any questions regarding this award and the application process please feel free to email me."



## Nathan Bocock - Computer Technology

"Late last year Mr Sly suggested to me that there was a funding programme for students wanting to start their own projects to further their learning, so I signed up at once. I had wanted to learn how to build a computer and in the end use it for coding. So I created a video explaining what I wanted to use it for and sent the application. It took a while but, when the money came I did some research and got advice on what components I should get. I built my computer, started coding on it and I'm really proud of how it turned out."



#### Bonnie Shaw - Creating a Manga novel

"I was granted \$750 from the Ministry of Education via their Gifted and Talented Learners programme at the end of 2021, towards the creation of Japanese Manga.

Japanese Manga are a form of comic books. However, manga differs from western comics in a few ways. Manga is read from right to left, rather than left to right. Manga art is almost always black and white, and the art in

Japanese manga is more simplified than the art seen in western comics. Manga also tends to contain less words than comics, and relies heavily on visuals. Each series of manga is also created by one manga author/artist and their team, then published by a publishing company, while western comics can be created and changed by various teams and sometimes published by various companies.

Manga used to be produced traditionally with ink and grain paper. However, with the rise of technology, manga is predominantly created digitally using a stylus and monitor, and drawing software.

The artwork shown here is an idea I was toying with. The story would have been set in Victorian England, and the characters shown would have been vigilantes aiming to eliminate the petty and cruel divides between the different social classes.



I will be attending The University of Otago next year to take up a Bachelor of Arts and Science degree, and will not be pursuing visual art for some time. However, I'm keen on turning to painting and comics/manga later on in life."

## Hard Materials & Digital Technology



## **Soft Materials**



# **Building Technology**

## Year 11

Students began the year by learning about the different types of woodworking joints, screws and fasteners. The students developed their ability in the use of hand tools and built upon this knowledge to construct a toolbox and tray which incorporated finger joints, dovetail joints, butt joints and housing joints. To personalise their projects the students



could utilise the laser cutter to incorporate their creativity into their work. Next the students worked on constructing some garden chairs. The students developed their ability in the use of power tools. The basic structure of the chairs were all the same but the students were again able to incorporate subtle customisations by routing the edges of their garden chairs, rounding the top of the back rest and staining the chairs.



## Year 12

Students began their major project for the year, a cupboard project. Each of the students first had to identify a need, opportunity and associated stakeholders before developing a design for their cupboards.

The students then produced CAD drawings of their projects before embarking on the project management of their work. Some students have incorporated CAD/CAM into their manufacture and others have opted to more traditional craftsmanship, giving the students the opportunity to be independent learners and have differentiated outcomes.



## Year 13

Students have had a creative time in building this year! A knowledge of materials and practical skills gained from previous years has enabled students to combine a variety of materials in their practical work, along with utilizing a variety of workshop machinery to enhance their product design. Students have designed tables, computer desks, Television stands and a variety of small cupboards to a high standard.

The 2022 year 11 students have been the most creative and experimental students I have taught at South Otago High School. Students have worked very hard and produced high quality products that would be considered a year 13 level. Using a variety of fixed machines and tools, students started the year off designing a small product to build up skill level and workshop confidence. Utilising new skills and knowledge students have gone on to design and manufacture firewood stands, firepits and companion sets.






## Year 12

Students began the year working on a group of new standards offered by Competenz which required them to work on a range of skills from basic draftsmanship to machining and fabrication. For the machining process the students made a g-clamp they first designed on CAD themselves and then progressed through turning the components on the Centre lathe and machining the cast aluminium body on the Milling machine. They then proceeded to work on their fabrication of a sheet alumium table lamp. Over the course of the two projects the boys have had an opportunity to utilise almost every machine in the workshop areas.

Design has been a huge focus this year with the year 13 students. A very high level of work has been done this year including such things as welding tables, firepits, computer tables and so much more. Utilising a number of fixed machines students have been incredibly creative and really worked hard to produce high outcomes. Using knowledge to combine a variety of materials such as steel, macrocarpa, pine, American white ash and alloys has brought a great variety to the design and manufacture of their work.

This year Sam Vining and Sam Affleck have worked on developing portfolios based on a variety of different designers to create their own furniture designs.

Keeley Puna undertook the design of a Pavilion for a space by the Clutha river utilizing knowledge gained through thorough research. Keeley has developed a large number of design ideas that address the stakeholder needs. Producing detailed designs along with CAD and model work.





## Digital Technology Year 11 12 13

In the DGT class the students have completed the programme for the Level One, Two and Three NCEA. The class is of mixed skill base and all have worked to the best of their ability. The challenge of learning different skills such as Databases, proposal reports, researching leading to the construction of games and websites. Then learning the construction of computers in a short period of time, is difficult for level one. So for some of the students it was an enormous task, and most of their goals were achieved through had work. Recognition to some students who worked exceptionally hard and achieved Excellence in the assessments. Digital technology is constantly changing and developing so a flexible learning is essential and the students rise to the challenge.



## SOREC Engineering Academy Year 11 & 12

This year we had a strong year 11 cohort opt for the SOREC Engineering Academy with Liam Anderson taking it up for the second year. This year we were able to offer level 2 credits for the course as a result of the fantastic work the students have done at each of the four employers this year, MD Engineering, Agri & Crates Engineering, McLay Boats and Calder Stewart.

Liam has been South Otago High Schools first success in the programme as he is the first to secure an apprenticeship. He will begin his apprenticeship next year with MD Engineering, where he had an opportunity to design and build the trailer you see below.

As well as enjoying student success we have also managed to renew all of the workbenches in the engineering end of the Technology Block, all benches have been built by SOREC students and gives our other students something to strive for.


















# Volleyball



### SOHS JUNIOR TECHNLOGY CENTRE 2022

The year 7 and 8 students from the district have completed an excellent range of Technology projects made and modified to meet a brief or opportunity. They have also integrated principles from Science, Engineering, Art, Design and Numeracy whilst applying functional modelling to prototypes and final outcomes. They have tested acids and bases on vegetable pigments creating botanical dyes for natural fabrics that are better for the environment. As well as applying various colour dyeing techniques to create certain affects. They used this fabric to cut a pattern, and machine sew a functional bag to use for their hobbies.



Students enjoyed creating and hand stitching personalised sewing kits using felt and embroidery thread based on their interests. Students used backstitching and created modern forms of line art using a canvas. They learnt how to apply mixed media to manipulate a design to suit an intended outcome within a set of specifications.

They also enjoyed developing skills in food processing technology by following elements of planning for practice and learning fun and tasty ways to prepare wholesome and healthy meals and drinks, including Mocktails.

The final projects for 2022 also included e- textiles. Students applied their knowledge of technological systems and basic electronics to stitch LEDs and connect them to flat cell batteries using conductive thread.
