Geography Y11 Stewart Island Trip

We ran the trips differently this year. We had three classes so there were too many students to run one trip. We divided the group into two and took them for half a week each. Wednesday saw one group leave as the others arrived in much the same way that we run the Year 10 camp. The other big change was that we changed where we stayed. Instead of staying in Oban we stayed at Mamaku Environmental Education Lodge. We were hoping a quieter location in a scenic reserve would increase our chances of seeing a Kiwi at night. Sadly we took a few too many noisy Kiwis of our own for that to eventuate.

We ran a similar programme to previous years but the new location added opportunities for fishing and swimming as well. There was also a penguin sanctuary on site and some students got the opportunity to feed them there. In Oban itself students spent time at the museum, the DOC visitors' centre and exploring the SIRCET displays about trapping on the island. The humour of seeing a trap made out of signs showing the former prime minister was a source of amusement to many.

The highlight of the trip was the visit to Ulva Island. This is a pest free sanctuary (though it has had a rat family settle there recently) that allows students to see a variety of wildlife. The sea lions and Weka on the beach as we arrived were a real treat and easy to find. There were some rarer species including the Kakariki (Red crowned parakeet) and Mohua (yellowhead) awaiting some of the groups and we were so lucky to see these. Walking around Ulva Island is always more rewarding when you can be as quiet as possible.

Overall field trips are about more than just subject content and making new environments accessible to students. They also give the students the opportunity to contribute positively to a bigger group, show respect for the environment and other's property as well as show empathy and compassion for others. It was great to see most of our students being able to do this on the trip.

A big thank you to Miss Bonney, Mr Carroll, Mr Williams and Mrs Wright for their work and help on the trip. We could not run these experiences without you.

We will actually take a break from going to Stewart Island next year. The new curriculum and standards really push us towards going to Aoraki/Mt Cook instead. The Year 10s should not worry though as the goal is to take Year 12 Geography to Stewart Island in 2025 so they won't miss out.


Geography Year 12 Mount Cook Trip



In early May 46 keen Year 12 Geography students headed to Aoraki/ Mt Cook to complete a research task and assist them with their end-of-year exam on the local area. Though the weather was never perfect and the students are still yet to see Aoraki / Mt Cook the trip was an amazing experience for the students.

The main task for the students to complete was collecting a range of data looking into how vegetation changes as altitude increases. Students measured things such as plant size, temperature, wind speed and plant type. The students did wonderfully at this task and collected solid data in wet conditions on a tricky climb up the Red Tarns track.

Alongside this students also visited the Twizel area, looked into the Hydroelectric dams, and visited the localsalmon farm. Sadly our plane trip was cancelled due to poor weather which was a real shame for all those on the trip.







Outdoor Education

Another year has passed and another group of students have experienced outdoor education at South Otago High School.

The year started off with another Year 10 camp at Tautuku and we were greeted by a week of beautiful weather. The students participated in a camp out, confidence course, abseiling and kayaking. For many, camp is an opportunity to push themselves outside of their comfort zone and to try something new and this was evident for a lot of the students. As always, activities such as camp require hard work and commitment from the staff involved and I would like to thank each of the teachers who attended.

The Year 12 Outdoor Education programme spent quite a bit of time in the outdoors this year. The Silver Peaks tramp introduced students to the course and for many this really tested their fitness and perseverance. The second day was the hardest with thick fog and areas of bog underfoot which made travel slow going.

The course introduced students not only to tramping but also navigation, mountain biking and most importantly, planning and risk management. This was necessary during the snow caving activity where students spent the night in the Pisa Range in snow caves that they had constructed themselves. The snow caves took approximately six hours to construct, however, these were constructed very well and managed to keep the students reasonably warm during the night.

The Year 13 Outdoor Education course utilised the new kayaks and spent most of the first term in the lagoon. The students learnt how to paddle the boats in flat water and in the river as well as how to complete rescues.

At the start of Term 2, students completed a tramp on the Kepler Track. A challenging 800m climb took us to Luxmore Hut where we stayed the night in fresh snow. Unfortunately due to these conditions, we could not go over the tops, however, managed to drive to Rainbow Reach and spend our second night at Moturau Hut.

Both Year 12 and 13 courses completed a rock unit where students learnt to abseil and climb. The Year 13 students took their climbing a step further and learnt the basics to lead climbing. This not only taught them how to clip quickdraws and climb, it also taught them how to fall.

Overall this was a great year for Outdoor Education at South Otago. Course numbers were high and there was great interest among all students.


Cricket

Some of the highlights of the season included:

I felt there was a typically strong South Otago vibe among the playing group and the on-field banter (always in good humour, clean and well-directed) was good to be around. At the end of the summer, I decided to step down from coaching for the time being with three kids of my own keeping me pretty busy at home. I hope that the boys will continue to play the game and look forward to hearing how they get on.



For tournament week we had four players who were unable to attend. We had a change of venue for once and travelled to Timaru to play. A quick glance at our pool showed the team was in a tough week with them being expected to play the South Canterbury, Central Otago and Otago champions for 2023 in the first two days. The team did very well to hold both Timaru Girls High School and Wakatipu High School to three goals in the first halves of Monday's games but both games blew out a bit in terms of the scores after halftime as senior players were rested for the end of the week.

A similar pattern followed with players being rested against Queens the next day seeing us finishing pool play with three losses out of three games.

Mandarin Classes 2023

I'm Mya Wu, a graduate student studying at Huazhong University of Science and Technology. 2023 is my second year of graduate school and I've been lucky enough to get the opportunity to come to New Zealand this year. Although Balclutha is very quiet, it didn't take me too long to fit in the new environment here probably because I grew up in the countryside and my hometown has some similarities with Balclutha.

I worked as a Mandarin Language Assistant in Balclutha and taught Mandarin in four schools: South Otago High School, Rosebank Primary School, Romahapa School, and Catlins Area School. It took me quite a while to get used to the teaching style in New Zealand. At the very beginning, teaching here was a little bit challenging for me because I had students from Y1 to Y11 and students of different ages are very different and have their own characteristics. So, I applied different teaching strategies according to students' age and year level. Compared with high school students, I prepared more class activities and designed more interesting games for primary school students.

In Mandarin classes this year, we have learned a lot of topics, like self-introduction, family members, countries, animals, body parts, money, food, fruits, sports, etc. Besides, I also carried out a lot of cultural activities, such as making dumplings, Chinese brush pen calligraphy, drawing plum blossom trees with ink, making Chinese knots, Chinese shadow puppetry, making paper dragon boats, paper cutting, and so on. All the students enjoyed these cultural activities a lot. I also discussed the cultural differences between New Zealand and China and shared what modern China looks like with them. Hopefully learning Mandarin can give them a glimpse of a different culture, broaden their horizons, and give them more opportunities in the future. I am very glad to see their improvements in language abilities and all the students I taught made my year colorful and meaningful.

Besides teaching, I also spend a lot of time traveling around New Zealand. I made the most of every term break to travel with my friends. We explored splendid mountains, lakes, seas, islands, small villages like Hokitika, and bustling cities like Auckland, which always amazed me. I enjoyed these fantastic trips, took a lot of pictures, and got precious memories.

How time flies! It's been almost one year since I came to New Zealand. I had a great time during my year in New Zealand. This year, I taught lots of students, saw a lot of gorgeous scenery, met a lot of people, and had lots of happy moments, which are all unforgettable for me. Although it's time to say goodbye, I'll take all these happy memories with me.

Junior Technology: 2023

This year has been a busy time in the Junior Technology Centre. We welcomed Anna from the Tuhara Science Outreach Team of Otago Museum who spent a few whole days with our students from Primary schools in the district. We investigated how rockets could be launched into space, the impact of lighting hydrogen gas and using it as fuel. We also spoke about the "Rocket lab" work taking place in the North Island. We used prototyping to make our own rockets and tested how high we could launch them into the air using pneumatics. Students made great learning connections between Science and Technology and how we can use this to develop and modify safe space travel.



Our year 7s and 8s have been applying the Technology Design Process to meet a brief. They have made spice racks, silhouettes, personalised signs, handstitched "Manu" keyrings, needle felted characters and scenes using wool. They have learnt how to prepare and present a range of cultural dishes, making pasta and apply scientific principles when making ice cream pops. Year 8 students have also learnt how to use a sewing machine and scroll saw. Year 7s have learnt how to use a hot poker, hand tools and a scroll saw. The year 8s finish their year having made personalised, functional pocket pillows. We congratulate all students on a very successful year in Junior Technology.

International Youth Science Forum

During Term 3, Jethro and I attended the London International Youth Science Forum. This was a 2 week long residential science programme, held predominately at Imperial College London, but also had visits throughout England and Wales. We were two of three South Island, and 15 New Zealanders in total of the approximately 500 participants.

We had lectures from leaders in their fields from across the world, such as Professor Ben Ferringa, 2016 Nobel Prize winner in Chemistry, Dame Sue Black Head of Forensics at Oxford University, and Professor Steve Cowley, Head of Princeton University's Plasma Physics laboratory.

While we also got to have specialist visits of our choosing throughout the UK. Personally, I had scientistic visits at the Cambridge Biomedical Research Institute, The School of Pharmacy and Brain Imaging in Wales, and the Great Britain Association of Anaesthetists. While Jethro had visits at the National Space Institute, Imperial College Department of Aerospace, and the Cambridge Scott Polar Institute.

As well as this, I got to present my research on Wetlands, Marshlands, and Swamps, at the Science Bazar, where I was able to talk to leaders in their fields, as well as the delegates from all round the world.

However, more than just the academic side of the event, we had plenty of opportunity to explore London, and meet everyone from all round the world, to make many connections and friendships. Which was the highlight for both Jethro and myself.

Overall it was an incredible opportunity, which allowed us to open our eyes to a whole plethora of different opportunities. Seeing how science can be applied to the real world, and where our future careers could take us.




